SUBJECT: 1st Quarter, Fiscal Year 2012 (FY12) Army Family Action Plan (AFAP) Steering  
Committee Meeting Minutes

1. The AFAP Steering Committee held its 1<sup>st</sup> Quarter update of FY12 on 15 November 2011, at the Jewish Chapel Social Hall. Mr. Anthony Brown, Directorate of Family and Morale, Welfare and Recreation (DFMWR), called the meeting to order.
2. COL Michael Tarsa, Garrison Commander (GC), provided opening remarks. He reported that he had attended the General Officers Steering Committee (GOSC) over the summer and there are concerns across the Army with the AFAP process. He stated that we must consider our new fiscal reality and consider what concerns we take on, ensuring that financial limitations are considered.
3. Ms. Overstreet informed the Committee that this will be the last time the Steering Committee will convene until after the Annual AFAP Conference, scheduled for 22-24 February 2012. Issues for the Conference are due 31 January 2012 and heavy marketing will commence during December and January to solicit for issues. Sixteen issues remain active currently. Three issues were forwarded to HQDA AFAP and nine will be reviewed during this meeting (Tab A).

5. The minutes and recommendations of the AFAP Steering Committee follow for review and decision.


6. 2011 AFAP Issues:

a. Mr. Anthony Brown, DFMWR, briefed Issue 11-03, Clarification of Home-Based Business Regulation (Tab B).

Mr. Brown reported that local home-based business owners are seeking more clear guidance about what they can and cannot do when they reside on post. DFMWR drafted suggested wording revisions and forwarded to proponents, which acknowledged receipt. The recommended changes for the Home-Based Business Regulation were accepted and will be published when the regulation is updated.

In addition, DFMWR is working the issue locally, drafting a one-page information paper to be distributed to the community. Information about registering home-based businesses will be included in the ACS in-processing brief from this point on as well. The issue was recommended for closure as completed.

**Recommendation:** Close Issue 11-03 as completed.

b. Mr. Brian Szeli, DFMWR CYSS, briefed Issue 11-04, West Point Community Instructional and Competitive Swim Program (Tab C).

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Mr. Szeli reported a developmental recreational swim program began in October 2011, with 16 participants. The program meets weekly for 8 weeks and is set to conclude in late January 2012. The program is not competitive but those enrolled needed to possess certain swimming proficiencies to be eligible. There was discussion about how this team is not a learn-to-swim program.

Additional volunteer swim coaches are needed to sustain the program. COL Tarsa requested that Mr. Szeli and Mr. Brown schedule a meeting with him for January to discuss the way ahead for this program. It was recommended that the issue remain open and be revisited at the next meeting.

**Recommendation:** Keep Issue 11-04 active; Revisit at the 3<sup>rd</sup> Quarter, FY12 meeting.

c. Mr. Dick King, DOL, briefed Issue 11-08, Accessible Patron Parking for Buildings 606, 705 and 900 (Tab D).

Mr. King reported that DOL already provides shuttle service, departing from Buffalo Soldier Field and stopping at or near Buildings 606, 705 and 900. Due to lack of riders, increasing price of fuel and financial constraints, the shuttle service was cut back to once per hour, effective 12 September.

There was discussion about how this issue centers around lack of customer parking, not the shuttle bus availability. It was discussed how we need to move forward with pursuing parking considerations at the clinics and Keller Army Community Hospital (KACH). Mr. Plumley, DGC, and CSM Carpenter, DES, will look at possibly marking three spots near North Apartments for customer parking.

The issue has been reassigned to DES. The Committee would like to keep the issue active and revisit at the next meeting.

**Recommendation:** Keep Issue 11-08 active; Revisit at the 3<sup>rd</sup> Quarter, FY12 meeting.

d. Mr. Anthony Brown, DFMWR, briefed Issue 11-09, Skateboard Park on West Point (Tab E) on behalf of Mr. Thane Kelley.

Mr. Brown reported since the last meeting, DFMWR explored D Lot along Stony Lonesome Road. However, the lot is going to be used as a staging area for the KACH construction project this spring. They have also explored various other sites. A seasonal skate board is a plausible solution that will be further explored. DFMWR is willing to purchase mobile units if, and when, funding becomes available.

**Recommendation:** Keep Issue 11-09 active; Revisit at the 3<sup>rd</sup> Quarter, FY12 meeting.

e. Ms. Michele Weisshaar, AAFES, briefed Issue 11-10, Used Video Game Retailer (Tab F).

Ms. Weisshaar reported that AAFES has made arrangements with a vendor to provide a, “play and trade” service as part of a 90-day pilot. Due to the construction at the Exchange, the pilot that was set to start in September was postponed. USCC provided recommendations about the ideal times for the vendor to offer its services, as the Cadets will likely be the main customers. There was discussion about how the construction at the Exchange is scheduled to be completed in the spring, but that the spring would not be an ideal timeframe to conduct the pilot. It was recommended that the issue remain open and be revisited at the next meeting.

**Recommendation:** Keep Issue 11-10 active; Revisit at the 3<sup>rd</sup> Quarter, FY12 meeting.

7. 2009 AFAP Issues:

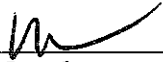
a. CH (MAJ) Randy Griffin, Chaplain, briefed Issue 09-04, Religious Support Facility on West Point (Tab G).

CH (MAJ) Griffin reported a Charette is the next necessary step. In May 2011, the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints donated \$200K to fund the Charette. In October, the Chaplain Corps met with DPW Master Planning, the Army Corps of Engineers, etc., regarding the project. The proposed design is a two-story, 25K square foot facility with classrooms, meeting space, childcare facility, etc. The proposed locations are at Biddle Loop, where the Chapel Annex is currently located or an area below Fort Putnam. The project will be part of the FY14 POM.

COL Tarsa indicated that the Superintendent’s primary focus is the new Cadet barracks. The challenge for this project will be the funding and he recommended that the focus be shifted to renovating an existing structure vice building. He asked DPW to contact him about the facility,

but advises no new building. It was recommended that the issue remain open and be revisited at the next meeting.

**Recommendation:** Keep Issue 09-04 active; Revisit at the 3<sup>rd</sup> Quarter, FY12 meeting.

b. Mr. Mike Colaccico, RCI, briefed Issue 09-07, Parking in Residential Areas (Tab H).

Mr. Colaccico reported that BBC has completed striping in New Brick and Grey Ghost. While BBC has done the research and plans to extend parking spaces in New Brick, the cost is \$70K and there are no funds available for this in 2012. He indicated that if and when funds are secured, the project will be executed as it needs to be done. It was recommended that the issue remain open and be revisited at the next meeting.

**Recommendation:** Keep Issue 09-07 active; Revisit at the 3<sup>rd</sup> Quarter, FY12 meeting.

c. Mr. Dick King, DOL, briefed Issue 09-12, Geographical Basic Allowance for Subsistence (BAS) (Tab I).

Mr. King indicated the recent opening of the United States Military Academy Preparatory School (USMAPS) created a dining facility (DFAC) for the community. The DFAC is open to active duty for breakfast, lunch and dinner. During the week, the first hour of each meal period the DFAC is reserved exclusively for USMAPS students. Hours for active duty are: 0700-0800 for breakfast, 1200-1300 for lunch and 1415-1900 for dinner. On the weekends, hours for all customers are: 0700-0830 for breakfast, 1130-1300 for lunch and 1730-1900 for dinner. It was recommended that the issue be closed as completed.

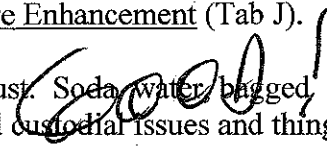

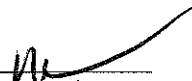

### Issue 11-03: Clarification of Home-Based Business Regulation

**Scope:** Army Regulation does not state what a home-based business owner is or is not permitted to do in easy to understand terms. Based on different interpretations, there is confusion regarding what home-based business owners can and cannot do. This affects the home-based business owner that operates on post and their communities.

**Conference Recommendation:** Amend the regulation to clarify definitions of relevant terms with respect to what is permitted and prohibited for on post home-based businesses.

### Issue 11-03 (cont'd)

**Progress/Response:**

- DFMWR agreed that local policy should be revised to clarify information for home-based business owners in the community.
- Proposed changes were forwarded to HQDA staff, which acknowledged receipt.
- A related article was published in the Pointer View on 4 August.
- A class was offered about home-based business rules at the ACS Symposium in September 2011 to clarify current regulatory guidance and answer questions.
- DFMWR will draft a one-page information paper to clarify policy for distribution to the community.

**Agency Recommendation:** Keep active; Revisit at next meeting.

### Issue 11-04: West Point Community Instructional and Competitive Swim Program

**Scope:** There is no year round indoor instructional swim program for members of the West Point Community at the Arvin Cadet Physical Development Center (CPDC). The current instructional swim program is only available during the summer months at Delafield Pond and is limited to three two-week sessions for school age children. This program does not offer a full spectrum of instruction (beginner to competitive levels). Due to inadequate access to facilities and resources the existing program is not meeting the needs of the community.

**Conference Recommendation:** Create and resource a year round instructional and competitive swim program inclusive of all ages and skill levels (beginner to competitive) for members of the West Point community at the Arvin Cadet Physical Development Center.

### Issue 11-04 (cont'd)

#### Progress/Response:

- A developmental recreational swim program became operational in October 2011 at Crandall pool in Arvin Gym. 16 of the 26 registered participants passed the required swim test.
- The program was originally scheduled to meet twice per week, but has been modified to meet once per week due to availability of volunteer swim coaches.
- Further modifications will be required as there is a large disparity among registered swimmers. Modifications will be outlined at the next scheduled swim practice.
- Recruitment of coaches will continue as additional coaches are needed to successfully continue this program.

**Agency Recommendation:** Keep active; Revisit at the next meeting.

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### Issue 11-08: Accessible Patron Parking for Buildings 606, 705 and 900

**Scope:** There is not adequate accessible patron parking for Buildings 606, 705, and 900. This prevents timely arrival to medical appointments and school events. Lack of parking impacts the entire West Point Army family community by affecting the operational business process and practices of the numerous organizations associated with these buildings.

**Conference Recommendation:** Provide permanent offsite parking for staff and faculty with simultaneous shuttle service during peak shift changes to Buildings 606, 705, and 900 thus increasing close proximity patron parking.

**POC:** Dick King

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### Issue 11-08 (cont'd)

**Progress/Response:**

- This issue recommends staff working in buildings 606 (Cadet Clinic/DENTAC), 705 (Schools) and 900 (Keller) park off-site and use shuttle service in an effort to provide more accessible patron parking.
- DOL already provides shuttle service from Buffalo Soldier Field to Mahan Hall (near Building 606) and Keller Hospital.
- Beginning on 12 September, shuttles began running every 60 minutes instead of every 30. Information about this was published in the Pointer View.
- During Keller's construction which will impact employee parking, there will be an additional shuttle for Keller employees.

**Agency Recommendation:** Keep active; revisit at next meeting.

### Issue 11-09: Skateboard Park on West Point

**Scope:** Avid skateboarders do not have a conducive environment to safely skateboard. A few installations that have skateboard parks are Fort Drum, Fort Belvoir, Tripler Housing Area, Fort Benning, Hickam Air Force Base, Schofield Barracks, and Aliumanu Military Reservation. The nearest skateboard park is 28 miles away, in Campbell Hall (Knolliewood Skate Park). Building a skate park will provide a safe and conducive environment to enjoy and correctly participate in skateboarding.

**Conference Recommendation:** Create a skateboard park.

**Lead Agency:** DFMWR

**POC:** Thane Kelley

### Issue 11-09 (cont'd)

**Progress/Response:**

- Balfour Beatty Communities (BBC) is unwilling to install/convert area for skateboard park within their footprint due to insurance/liability concerns. None of the installations listed in the issue scope are BBC-managed.
- Building a skateboard park is cost prohibitive. If placed on a flat, blacktopped area cost is estimated to be \$30K. In an unpaved area, the cost would increase exponentially.
- Following the last meeting, D lot (along Stony Lonesome Road) was explored as a possibility. DPW informed the committee that the area is going to be used as a staging area for Keller Army Community Hospital construction beginning this spring.
- DFMWR will continue to explore locations and associated cost.

**Agency Recommendation:** Keep active; Revisit at next meeting.

### Issue 11-10: Used Video Game Retailer

**Scope:** There are no available used game retailers at West Point. The nearest used video game retailer is 15 miles away in Central Valley. A used video games retailer or a used games service at the PX would serve all the cadets, soldiers, and families at West Point.

#### Conference Recommendations:

1. Install a used games retailer in the PX complex.
2. Implement a service for the trading in and purchasing of used video games at the PX.

### Issue 11-10 (cont'd)

#### Progress/Response:

- AAFES has received a commitment from a vendor to provide "play and trade" services two days per week. Customers will be able to trade and purchase games.
- A test pilot will be conducted to measure success and determine if a long-term option is possible.
- At the last meeting, AAFES indicated the pilot will commence after USCC provided schedule recommendations as cadets are likely to be majority of customers.
- The Exchange is under renovation and space is being reconfigured. Delay may occur due to construction at the Exchange.
- USCC reports that weekend hours are best: Saturday until 6pm and Sunday until 6pm.

**Agency Recommendation:** Keep active; Revisit at next meeting.

### Issue 09-04: Religious Support Facility at West Point

**Scope:** Religious Support Programs have inadequate meeting space. The historical nature of West Point chapels restrict building expansion and annex codes limit available space for childcare programs. Family members are being turned away from Religious Support Programs.

**Conference Recommendations:**

- (1) Establish an interfaith facility that accommodates multiple Religious Support Programs and associated childcare.
- (2) Require the facility to have rooms that comply with childcare codes.

**Lead Agency:** Chaplain (Assist from DPW)

**POC:** CH Randy Griffin

### Issue 09-04 (cont'd)

**Progress/Response:**

- During FY09, the West Point Chapel was the second largest attended program in the Northeast Region.
- Currently, multiple facilities throughout post are used by chapel programs creating logistical issues for both staff and participants.
- A Charette will determine the needs of the user community, identify possible sites and designs, estimate costs and other engineering issues.
- On 2 May 2011, the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints donated \$200K to fund the Charette. The funding has been accepted by the USAG RMO from AOG.
- DPW will recommend the Charette for 1Q FY12 if internal resources are available.

**Recommendation:** Keep Active; Revisit at next meeting.

### Issue 09-07: Parking in Residential Areas

**Scope:** There is inadequate parking in residential areas for Families assigned to on post Family housing and their visitors. Current policy does not meet the parking needs of Families residing in older constructed housing on West Point. Most Families have two (2) vehicles and one (1) or no assigned spaces forcing Families to park in the street. As a result, street congestion creates safety hazards for residents, children, teen, pets, and emergency vehicles.

#### Conference Recommendations:

- (1) For all on post Family housing, not just new construction, amend the policy to provide two assigned parking spaces and one visitor parking space in the vicinity of the physical address.
- (2) Develop additional off street parking in and around residential areas in order to decrease the amount of street congestion and safety hazards.

### Issue 09-07 (cont'd)

#### Progress/Response:

- Housing areas were surveyed to identify where spaces can be marked. Striping was completed in New Brick and Grey Ghost.
- BBC has identified 48 parking spaces (24 2-car parking spaces) that can be extended in New Brick. The estimated cost is \$70K. There are no funds available to complete this work in 2012.

**Recommendation:** Keep Active; Revisit at next meeting.

### Issue 09-12: Geographical Basic Allowance for Subsistence (BAS)

**Scope:** Current BAS rates are standardized nationwide and do not reflect cost of living differences between different geographic locations. Geographic variations in Basic Allowance for Housing (BAH), however, demonstrate that there are cost of living differences from location to location. Cost of living variations should be considered in BAS as well as BAH to minimize out of pocket expenses.

#### Conference Recommendations:

1. Adjust BAS rates to reflect the cost of living in various geographic locations.
2. Implement BAS II, a DOD-approved supplemental BAS program currently used by the Navy, for single Soldiers in the Army.

### Issue 09-12 (cont'd)

#### Progress/Response:

- Recommendation 2 was closed as completed following the November 2010 AFAP Steering Committee meeting.
- Recommendation 1 was forwarded to HQDA AFAP for inclusion in the 2011 conference held in January 2011. While the issue was viewed as important by the delegation, it was not prioritized primarily due to information contained in the information paper that indicated the issue was related to inadequate cooking facilities for Soldiers in the barracks.
- On August 8, the USMAPS dining facility became open to active duty. During the week, the first hour of each meal period is reserved exclusively for USMAPS.
- At the last meeting, DOL indicated it would research whether a swipe card system was feasible.

**Recommendation:** Close as completed.

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### Issue 09-17: Movie Theater Enhancement

**Scope:** Current policy bans food and drink; movies are no longer current when they reach the theatre. It diminishes the movie-going experience. People are less inclined to go or simply don't go to see a movie when they are outdated, especially when they can't have food and beverage.

#### Conference Recommendations:

1. Revise policy to allow food and drink by providing concessions.
2. Consider new location if above is not attainable.
3. Consider accommodating additional hours for school breaks, holidays and matinees.
4. Keep movie selection current.

**POC:** Tony Brown

#### Progress/Response:

- DFMWR took the lead on this issue following the November 2010 Steering Committee meeting.
- AAFES began a 90-day "pilot" in mid-August to offer limited concessions (bottled water and soda, chips, popcorn, etc.)
- AAFES manages custodial responsibilities.
- AAFES is averaging about \$150/month in concession sales.
- AAFES has not received feedback from customers.

**Recommendation:** Close as completed.

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
